## What's in a Name?

No doubt you will have noticed from the masthead above (beautifully designed by **Ron Hines**) that what used to be “The GOOD NEWSletter” has a new name – *The Chi Rho*. (That’s pronounced Ki (long i), Row (your boat).

The Chi Rho symbol is an ancient one, with at least two different meanings. The more familiar meaning of the symbol is that it represents the first two letters in “Christ” – and Jesus, of course, lies at the heart of everything we attempt to do here at Christ the King.

The other meaning, not quite as well known, is that Chi Rho can also represent two Latin words: *Christus Rex*, or Christ the King. Certainly an appropriate symbol for our parish!

Of course there will be a long learning curve before “have you gotten your *Chi Rho* yet?” replaces “have you gotten your newsletter yet”? But it will be nice to look at the top of each month’s issue and remember that it’s all about Christ, and proclaiming the Good News of a congregation in which he is Lord and King.

## Your Rector's Reflections

Happy 51<sup>st</sup> Anniversary, Christ the King!

## Around the Parish

### Annual Meeting Highlights

Over one hundred members of CTK gathered on January 22<sup>nd</sup> for the Annual Parish Meeting marking the end of our 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and leading us into our next half-century of worship, mission, and fellowship.

After a wonderful lunch, Father Steve called the meeting to order and introduced the nominees for Vestry prior to balloting: **Mary Lou Brannin, Lisa Hines, Sharon Jones, Kent Roberts, and Bill Wadley**. He then narrated a slide show recalling some of the high points of 2005. An updated set of by-laws for the parish was approved. The 2006 operating budget was presented and discussed – noting especially the ongoing faithfulness of CTK members in increasing their stewardship commitment and keeping (or exceeding) that commitment. Vestry elections were held, retiring Vestry members were recognized, and the 2006 Senior Warden was announced.

In other Vestry news, **Debby Donaldson** has been tapped to serve as Clerk of the Vestry, replacing **Pat Roberts**, who is currently doing fieldwork at St. John the Baptist Church as a part of her preparation for ordination to the Order of Deacons.

Congratulations to those newly elected and appointed; may God richly bless our parish leaders in the year to come!

At the Annual Parish Meeting, four members of the Vestry completed their terms of service, and were recognized for the sharing of their gifts with the congregation.

A New Beginnings (NB) weekend is a time when young Christians can "retreat" from their ever-hectic world to consider some of the important relationships in their lives—with parents, with siblings, with peers, and with their Lord. The weekend is led by a team of youth with adult support. In addition to songs, games and skits, youth leaders present short talks on the following topics: Friends, Siblings, Parents, School, What is Love?, Who is Jesus?, and The Church. Small groups provide the opportunity to learn and share together.

We want to send a group to New Beginnings at Honey Creek (an Episcopal retreat center in South Georgia) over the weekend of March 24-26. If you are an adult and might be interested in attending this weekend as a chaperone (you will have no responsibilities except to be present), please speak to Pastor Sonia.

### Youth Mission Trip

The Youth Mission Trip will be to inner-city New York this summer from July 9 - 17. All students who have completed the 6<sup>th</sup> grade in May are invited to attend. The cost will be no more than \$300 each and there is some scholarship assistance available. ## The Bible: God's message to you

Taken from God is in the small stuff by Bruce & Stan

The Bible is the world's most amazing book. More than six billion copies of the Bible have been published since Gutenberg printed the first one five hundred years ago. The Bible has been translated into more than two thousand languages (and counting). More than ninety percent of all households in American have at least one Bible, and nearly four out of every ten people claim to read the Bible at least once a week, not counting church. No other book has even come close to the Bible's popularity and influence.

The Bible is the world's all-time best-seller for one very simple reason: It's God's book. You may not think of God as an author, but that's exactly what He is. God is the author, and *you* are the audience He wants to read. You see, authors want people to read their books (otherwise they wouldn't write them). God is no different. He's written the Bible, and He wants you to read it.

So why a book? Why not voice commands or mental telepathy or skywriting? Because human language – especially when it's written down – is the most effective and accurate way to communicate. God chose to speak to us through words on a page because it's the best way to communicate the details of His message to us.

What does this mean to you? Simply this. When you read the Bible, you are reading God's message for you. The Bible is not just an option for knowing God and the secrets of the universe. It's the *only* way for you to accurately discover the details of God's plan for you. For example, through the Bible you can learn that God created you. You can discover that God loved you so much that He sent Jesus to earth so you could see what God is like in person. And you can find out that Jesus is coming back to earth again in the future.

The Bible has all of that and more. So don't waste another day. Dust off that Bible in your house and open it. As you read, God will begin to speak to you. And what He has to say may very well change your life.
