Sunday, July 15, mid afternoon - leave and travel to Tallahassee

Sunday, July 22 - Travel to Gulf Shores AL and play at Waterville USA; overnight there

We are saddened to learn that Origins Montessori Charter School has been closed by the Orange County Schools as of June 30th.

We have enjoyed the presence of children on our campus throughout the week, and of course Origins was a Godsend when CTK was struggling to find the funds to call a new Rector five years ago. The Finance Committee and Vestry will be in discern-

ment about what the closing of Origins might mean, and a Task Force on Facility Use has already met to begin the process of discerning how God would have us open our facilities in ways consistent with our mission.

How God calls you to a specific place and leads you to the right Church — by Luz Cotto

M

y husband Tony and I moved to Texas in May 1982, a place I never dreamed we were going to spend twenty years of our life. Tony's passion was to help the needy and poor. He started working with Catholic Charities helping the Hispanic Community. He met a husband and wife lawyer team, and started a program for immigration at a Lutheran Church. The church noticed the devotion that Tony had to bringing comfort and the word of God to those who were in need of it, and asked him if he would like to become a preacher. This was his lifelong dream, but because he was born and raised a Roman Catholic and married, he was not accepted as a priest in the Catholic Church. In 1991 he decided to enter the Lutheran Seminary Program in the southwest. He was ordained in 1994 and founded San Miguel Lutheran Church in Fort Worth, Texas. It was named in honor of his brother who had passed on. We grew from thirteen people to over 400 a week. We worked hard to build that church. With him I became more involved in the Word of the Lord and the ministry. He became ill slowly, with diabetes and heart problems. I decided that he needed to retire and come to Florida where he had some family.

We had come down two years before to scope out locations for churches, but we remained undecided. In 2002 we decided it was the right time and made the move. At that time, the Spanish pastor at Cristo Rey was leaving, so they asked Tony if he would be willing to take on the group. I was a little worried because he was not healthy, but he accepted the job part-time. He did it for four years before the Lord welcomed him home. I then decided to join Christ the King 's English service because the people always were friendly and I felt like they always accepted us as brothers and sisters of God. They gave me a lot of support in my most difficult time of sorrow. Father Steve, Pastor Sonia and Deacon Pat were there with me and my family at the hospital. They were a great support for us. We are very grateful to the Christ the King family for the love they share with us.

The lord put us in the right place.

This is in honor of the memory of Father Antonia Cotto.

Some of us see success as making lots of money, living com-

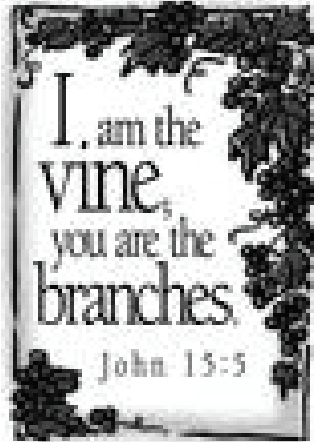
